The season of Pentecost is a season of growth and renewal.

The Processional Hymn was written in 1715 by the great English hymnwriter, Isaac Watts. It is known as the first hymn intended for use by children. The tune to the Processional Hymn, FOREST GREEN, is a traditional English melody arranged by the English composer, Ralph Vaughan Williams, who during his lifetime, collected the folk songs of England.

WORSHIP NOTES

Forest Green is the name of a town in Surrey, England, where Vaughan Williams first heard this tune.

The text to the Response is the first verse of the hymn, "Praise My Soul, the King of Heaven," written in 1834 by Scottish-born poet, Rev. Henry Lyte.

The text to the Gloria Patri was written by Anglican priest, the late Rev. Fredrick Edwin Le Grice, who before retiring, was Dean of Ripon Cathedral in Ripon, England. The Gloria Patri is a short hymn text that praises the Trinity: God the Father, God the Son, and God the Holy Spirit.

The Preparation for Prayer was written by Mark Friedman, who has served as a Catholic liturgical minister for over 30 years in the Archdiocese of Cincinnati, Ohio. The song is a plea for wholeness

The text to the anthem was written in 1779 by John Newton. It is known by scholars as an autobiographical hymn text about Newton's turn to Christianity after serving as a slave trader. The final verse, "When we've been there ten thousand years" was not written by Newton, but first appeared in 19th c. collection called A Collection of Sacred Ballads. In this arrangement, composer Mark Hayes doesn't use the traditional 19th c. American melody everyone knows. Instead, Hayes paired this beloved text with an adaptation of the English tune, O WALY, WALY created in 1972 by Hal Hopson, who named the adapted tune, THE GIFT OF LOVE. Mark Hayes is a prolific composer and arranger who is also known as a concert pianist. The accompaniments to his anthems often feature the pianist. When you listen to the introduction played on the piano, the way Hayes wrote the piano part brings to mind the rise and fall of waves on the ocean, a reference to Newton and his time as a slave trader on a ship crossing the Atlantic Ocean.

WORSHIP NOTES

The Doxology is a hymn of praise to God that is Trinitarian in nature praising God the Father, God the Son, and God the Holy Spirit. The text is an altered version of the original text from 1674 and was written in 1974 by Rev. Dr. Gilbert Vieira, United Methodist minister in the San Francisco Bay area of California. The tune is a German Catholic tune dating from 1623. The harmony was

created in 1906 by the great

British composer, Ralph Vaughan Williams.

Hymn #557 was written in 1930 by Harry Emerson Fosdick while living at his summer home in Boothbay Harbor, Maine. It was written as the processional hymn for the dedication service of the (non-denominational) Riverside Church in New York City on October 5, 1930 where Fosdick served as the church's first minister. The tune, CWM RHONDDA, was composed in 1907 by amateur musician, John Hughes, who worked for the coal mining industry. CWM RHONDDA is named after the Rhondda Valley, a coal mining district in South Wales. Hughes wrote music as Sunday school marches, anthems and hymn tunes while he attended Salem Baptist Church.
